Open educational resources (OERs) are freely accessible, <u>openly licensed text</u>, <u>media</u>, and <u>other digital assets</u> that are useful for *teaching*, *learning*, and *ass*essing as well as for *research* purposes.

A free license or open license is a license agreement which contains provisions that allow other individuals to reuse another creator's work [...]. Without a special license, these uses are normally prohibited by <u>copyright</u> law or commercial license.

The term **OER** describes publicly accessible materials and resources for any user to <u>use</u>, <u>re-mix</u>, <u>improve</u> and <u>redistribute</u> <u>under some licenses</u>.

The Hewlett Foundation updated its definition to:


Open Educational Resources are *teaching*, *learning* and *research* materials in any medium – digital or otherwise – that reside in the public domain or have been released under an open license that permits no-cost access, use, adaptation and redistribution by others with no or limited restrictions".

The new definition explicitly states that OER can include both digital and non-digital resources. Also, it lists several types of use that OER permit, inspired by **5R activities of OER**. Users of OER are allowed to engage in any of these 5R activities, permitted by the use of an **open license**.

5R activities/permissions were proposed by David Wiley, as follows:





The <u>Creative Commons license</u> is the most widely used licensing framework internationally used for OER.

[...] alternative and more flexible licensing options have become available as a result of the work of <u>Creative</u> <u>Commons</u>, a non-profit organization that provides readymade licensing agreements that are less restrictive than the "*all rights reserved*" terms of standard international copyright.

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- is used when an author wants to give other people the right to share, use, and build upon a work that they (the author) have created;
- provides an author flexibility; for example, they might choose to allow only non-commercial uses of a given work;
- protects the people who use or redistribute an author's work from concerns of copyright infringement as long as they abide by the conditions that are specified in the license by which the author distributes the work.



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	Non-commercial (NC)	Licensees may copy, distribute, display, and perform the work and make derivative works and remixes based on it only for non- commercial purposes.
	No Derivative Works (ND)	Licensees may copy, distribute, display and perform only verbatim copies of the work, not derivative works and remixes based on it. Since version 4.0, derivative works are allowed but must not be shared.
